SCHOOL LIFE IN THE 1940S

We wanted to share with our community an email received from a past pupil about his memories of school life. We have shared this with our students and hope some of them will reply with what it is like today.

Maungatapere School

I attended Maungatapere Primary School in the mid 1940's while my father was stationed at the Electrical substation. Now 86 years of age I still have great memories of those days when it was a two classroom building with Mr Russell Butler as head master and teaching Standards 3 to 6 while Mrs Burchell taught the lower classes, about 60 pupils in all. A few highlights from those times:

When my younger brother David , and close mates Neil and Douglas Stevens all came to school on the back of Bonnie, their massive old Shire draft horse. It was common place then for some pupils to ride horses to school and a paddock was provided for them. Bonnie the horse was used to haul a scoop to dig much of the first swimming pool the school had, an unfiltered pool that was emptied every week or so and re filled as there was no filtering system!

Mr Butler held a Master of Arts degree with honors in mathematics and he tended to over teach this subject at the expense of other subjects but not to any real disadvantage, sitting Standards 3,4,5 and 6 in separate rows and giving each row a lesson to carry on with before moving on to the next did tend to distract and/or allow younger pupils to learn ahead of the pack so by the time I went to Form 1 at Whangarei Boys High school I found myself well ahead in maths and geometry but behind in history and geography but it all soon evened out.

Sport was to the fore then to the extent that we had one rugby ball, one netball, one cricket bat and a few tennis balls as our gear. We boys played rugby, five a side as that was all the number that we could muster but we had one boy in Standard six, Henry Maxwell, a huge lad, almost of Jonah Lomu proportions who later became an international Rugby League star playing for New Zealand.

Henry once played on his own against the rest and I have memories of him ploughing down the field with the ball under his arm while ten or more kids clambered on his back and clung to his arms and legs like leaches but he was unstoppable! Someone inevitably got hurt so Mr Butler suggested that we should play a lesser contact game so we reverted to hockey using bent end Manuka saplings and a tennis ball. Playing soccer was not an option as the girls wouldn't allow us to use

their netball! Rounders, French Cricket, and Hopscotch filled in the rest of the play time.

There was a big fruitful Louquat tree over the school back boundary at the rear of the Memorial Church that used to be laden with fruit in season. We were forbidden to go out of bounds during the day so many took that route home so that they got their fill.

I was at the school when World War Two in Europe ended, we were all seated at our desks waiting the arrival of Mr Butler who always used to listen to the BBC short wave radio news headlines at 9am before coming from his home next door. We were all sitting there, quiet as mice when the headmaster burst in to say to the class monitor Jack Rowland, "put up the flag Jack, ring the bell, the war is over so you can all go home for the day". Off I rushed expecting to be able to tell my father the news only to arrive breathless and to find the Substation staff already toasting the event. I arrived at the school too late to experience the American troop training camp established on Hailes farm between the Church and the village Hall. Rides in army vehicles etc, every child had a story!
